## Community heritage survey rolled out across Subiaco

A community heritage survey will be rolled out street-by-street across the city following the successful Kershaw Street pilot.

The heritage survey was developed in response to the community's feedback that it wants to see heritage buildings and streetscapes protected, which was expressed as part of the Think2030 visioning process.

Mayor Heather Henderson said the pilot survey assisted the city to determine how the community would be involved and how places and areas of cultural heritage significance would be identified.

"The survey will be now rolled out to the remainder of James Chester's original subdivision, which is bounded by Townsend, Heytesbury, Rokeby and Hamersley roads.

"Rawson Street will also be progressed as a priority after several nominations were received from its residents.

"Heritage listing is a sensitive process and there is a high level of community input required.

"The city will prioritise the areas and streets to be surveyed, with the process expected to take quite some time," Mayor Henderson said.

Council will consider whether to declare Kershaw Street as a conservation area at its February meeting. If declared, a local planning policy (LPP) will be developed, with input from residents, to guide how heritage values are protected and enhanced.
