E-PERMIT PARKING UPDATE

The introduction of e-permits commenced in August 2023 with digital commercial parking permits, followed by residential, visitor and temporary parking permits in November 2023.

The system is part of the City's plans to improve parking opportunities for people living and working in Subiaco during business hours. The new e-permit system will help to maximise the number of available parking spaces during working hours by ensuring both residents' and visitors' parking spaces are being used in accordance with City rules.

While the rules and restrictions around parking permits have not changed, the new system makes it easier to detect misuse - whether intentional or unintentional and ensures people are on the best type of permit for their individual needs.

The City has been receiving helpful feedback from residents about the e-permit system and has been sharing it with our technology provider. Thanks to this feedback, our technology provider is making a range of improvements to help make the system more user-friendly.

The City's Compliance Team is not only available but welcomes the community to get one-on-one help when they need it.

Pictured is Mayor David McMullen at the opening of a new nature-based playground designed for younger children, located at Lake Jualbup. It includes a swing (with one infant seat and one strap seat), slide, sensory posts, balance logs and mini monkey bars. The design was selected following a multistage consultation process which started in July 2022, and our community has already been making good use of the space.

The second stage of the mixed-use sporting area at Rosalie Park has also been completed, featuring play elements of parkour, wall climbing and sliding; complementing the stage one additions of basketball, cricket, tennis, netball and ping pong facilities, and the community garden beds.

Events in Subiaco parks over summer have been well attended, including the free sunset@subi concert series, and the Subi Night Market on Saturdays. The Night Market season kicked off in November 2023, with more than 5000 people coming down to Market Square Park in the opening weeks to grab some culinary delights and delicious tipples from dozens of Perth's best food trucks.

The markets will be at Market Square Park until Saturday 6 April, so don't miss your chance to bring a picnic rug and dine in this European-inspired village atmosphere.

Mayor David McMullen said, "Our City's parks and playgrounds are great venues for organised events; but of course they are always a fantastic backdrop to create your own fun, or to just unwind, whenever you like.

"With the arrival of autumn, this is a great time of year to make the most of these fantastic outdoor spaces. Whether you have a young family like I do or are at a different stage of life, there's hours and hours to be spent outdoors in the City of Subiaco."

SUSTAINABILITY FOCUS

FOGO ROLLING OUT TO APARTMENTS

Since the Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO) bin service commenced for single-unit dwellings, or houses, in the City in May 2023, our residents have reduced waste to landfill by 20 per cent.

The good news is that if you live in an apartment or unit block, the City has started rolling out FOGO to these residences too. The City aims to include 60 per cent of multi-unit dwellings in the FOGO bin service by the end of June 2024, increasing the amount of methane-producing organics we can collectively save from landfill.

Contamination rates of FOGO are around 2 per cent – which is considered low to medium – with soft plastics accounting for the majority of this, including wrappers, non-compostable plastic bags and other packaging.

FOGO-derived compost is now available for purchase at the West Metro Recycling Centre in Shenton Park for \$5.50 a bag. While you're there, City of Subiaco residents can also pick up free mulch. Find out more at www.subiaco.wa.gov.au/fogo.





Please remember not to use plastic bags in your FOGO kitchen caddy. If you're running low on caddy liners, you can buy compostable liners with the certified compostable leaf symbol from most supermarkets and hardware stores.

BULK GREEN WASTE

Garden waste (leaves, small branches, lawn clippings) can be put in your FOGO bin with your food scraps for collection weekly. The City also provides additional bulk green waste collections during the year, with the next one scheduled to commence on Monday 13 May 2024. Please place any loose green waste out by the evening of Sunday 12 May.



AN EGG-CELLENT IDEA!

Did you know you can recycle the foil packaging from your Easter eggs? All you need to do is scrunch the wrappers into a ball, no smaller than the size of a small fist.

Aluminium is highly recyclable – 75 per cent of aluminium ever produced is still in use today. For more Easter waste wise tips, our

BULK WASTE COLLECTION CHANGES

The City's Verge Valet® trial has finished and bookings are no longer being taken. The City of Subiaco has returned to bi-annual bulk verge collections, and the next one will take place in August 2024. Check www.subiaco.wa.gov.au/waste for more details when available.

Residents can also use their bulk waste pass (valid for one cubic metre) at the West Metro Recycling Centre. Passes are attached to the bottom of your 2023/24 waste and recycling calendar. If you've misplaced your calendar, call 9237 9222 or email waste@subiaco.wa.gov.au to request a replacement.

GOOD FRIDAY COLLECTION ON A SATURDAY

Our waste team will be taking a quick break on Friday 29 March, so there will be no waste collection on that day. If your normal bin collection day is Friday, your bins will be collected on Saturday 30 March. Normal waste services resume on Monday 1 April 2024.



This edition's expert tip comes from our Environmental Projects Officer, who has some handy hints on creating a waterwise verge.

- 1. Residents are welcome to establish and maintain the verge in front of their property. The City encourages landscaping with low water use plants and works with APACE nursery in North Fremantle to provide native plants at the subsidised rate of \$2.50. Keep an eye out for more information about this scheme on the City's website in May.
- 2. Late autumn or early winter is a great time to plant, as rainfall through the cooler months will help establish the plants' root systems. You can also apply a 5-10cm thick layer of mulch at the time of planting, making sure it is kept clear from the base of all new plants.
- 3. Verge street trees are managed by the City. The City's written approval is needed before pruning, damaging, or removing trees located on council property. Residents can call 9237 9222 or email city@subiaco.wa.gov.au if they think their verge tree needs attention.

DID YOU KNOW?

A huge number of fires across Australia are caused by batteries being thrown into household bins each year, leading to fires in waste trucks and recycling facilities, creating costly clean-ups, delaying waste collection, and posing a danger to the environment.

Many technology stores now accept old devices such as mobile phones, and there are dedicated drop-off points for batteries, including the West Metro Recycling Centre, Return-It Shenton Park, Bunnings Warehouse Homebase, Woolworths Subiaco Square and Coles Subiaco Square.

Remember, if you had to charge it, it's got a battery!

This property received funding to remove paint from the brickwork and re-instate the tuckpointing. The works have revealed a lost streetscape character and notably enhanced and contributed to the building's heritage values.

CITY SUPPORTS JUSTICE SERVICES

Subiaco resident and former Deputy Mayor of the City Judith Gedero (pictured above) regularly gives back to local residents by volunteering at the Justice of the Peace service run by Subiaco Library. This service for local community members who need documentation witnessed is available every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, from 2pm to 3pm. No bookings necessary. Should your document require a second witness signature, please bring someone along with you.

The City also has a partnership with the Subiaco Justice Centre, a not-for-profit community legal service providing access to justice to those who need it the most. They help disadvantaged people with 30-minute consultations with a volunteer lawyer who can determine whether you have a legal problem, suggest possible options and provide referrals.
