Hay Street development application for demolition refused

At a Special Council Meeting on Thursday 27 May, Council refused an application to demolish the buildings at 424-436 and 440 Hay Street.

These buildings have heritage significance and contribute positively to the Rokeby Road and Hay Street Heritage area, and the application was inconsistent with a number of elements of the planning framework which seeks to protect and preserve the City's heritage and character.

Community consultation on the application showed strong objection to demolition.

The owners of these properties lodged an application with the State Administrative Tribunal (SAT) in March after the City issued building orders which included stabilisation works to 424-436 Hay Street – an important step in working towards a safe full reopening of the road. SAT has not yet made a decision on this matter.

Finalisation of Local Planning Policy

At the 18 May 2021 Ordinary Council Meeting, Council proceeded with Local Planning Policy 8.1 'Exemption from the Need to Obtain Development Approval for Land Use in the Centre, Local Centre and Mixed Use Zones' (LPP 8.1). The policy is a reviewed and amended version of Local Planning Policy 8.1 'Land Use in the Town Centre and Town Centre Development Zone'. LPP 8.1 responds to the changes in the planning framework that have occurred since the previous policy was adopted in 2016 and expands the zones eligible for land use exemptions. Draft Local Planning Policy open for comment

The City of Subiaco is inviting public comment on draft Local Planning Policy 5.1 – Car Parking and Transport, which forms part of the broader review of the City's local planning policies. The policy provides discretionary criteria to assess variations to non-residential car parking standards, and provides guidance for the requirement for Transport Impact Assessments, Parking Management Plans and Travel Plans to be submitted in support of development applications.
