

Hay Street now open

Hay Street partially reopened on Wednesday 10 March after the building owner's (Sanur) structural engineers agreed with the City's specialist heritage structural engineers that 440 Hay Street was not at imminent risk of collapse.

This meant the exclusion zone could be reduced because the buildings at 424-436 Hay Street are only one-storey high. Hoarding is still required in front of these buildings until Sanur completes the directed works to make it safe to reopen the balance of the road.

Sanur sought an injunction with the State Administrative Tribunal (SAT) to prevent the City from taking steps to reopen Hay Street. The City attended SAT on Friday 5 March and opposed Sanur's requests. On Monday 8 March, Sanur withdrew their application for an injunction.

"The City is extremely pleased to be able to reopen Hay Street, and return traffic flow to this important arterial road," A/CEO Cliff Frewing said. "It will also return street parking to the area, and ensure the local businesses are receiving passing traffic flow."

Part of the unanimous Council resolution to reopen Hay Street included investigating opportunities to support the businesses impacted by the closure. Promotional activities have already begun through the City's digital channels to help encourage visitation and on-site signage is being implemented to help direct foot traffic and support activation of the precinct.

City initiative helps educate dog owners

City rangers have been dishing out paw-some giveaways and ter-ruff-ic advice recently to dog owners in local parks to help reinforce City rules around responsibly owning and exercising a four-legged friend.

The initiative was developed in response to an increase in dog-attack incidents, community feedback concerning dogs being off-lead in on-lead areas, as well as ranger observation of dog owners demonstrating a lack of consideration and responsibility for pet behaviour.

The need for an education-first approach was identified, leading to City rangers using giveaways as a conversation starter and positive reminder for pet owners. The program has delivered positive results.
