Bushfire season

The City of Subiaco's fire season runs from 1 November 2021 to 31 March 2022, which means it's time to ensure your home doesn't present a fire hazard.

Vegetation can become significantly dry during this period, increasing the threat of fire so please ensure vegetation and gardens are managed so that grass is no greater than five centimetres in length, trees and shrubs near structures are appropriately pruned, and roofs and gutters are free of flammable material.

The burning of garden refuse is strictly prohibited within the City of Subiaco.

Under the Bush Fires Act 1954, significant penalties apply for failing to comply with these requirements.

Public apology by Mayor Penny Taylor

A complaint was made to the Local Government Standards Panel, in which it was alleged that I contravened the Regulations 2007 (WA) when I made certain negative comments that were published in an article in the West Australian regarding a Petition to change the method of voting for the Mayor of the City.

The Panel found that I breached regulation 7(1)(b) of said Regulations three times as either:

- i. The comments were inaccurate and misleading as to the nature of the Petition;
- ii. The comments were not made in good
- iii. It was not made clear that I was speaking personally rather than as a spokesperson for the City.

I accept that I should not have made such comments regarding the nature of the Petition and the parties coordinating the Petition.

I now apologise to all parties who may have been offended by my comments, my fellow Councillors and the public.
