## Subiaco's Soldiers' Stories

Thursday 3 April

As ANZAC Day approaches, explore Subiaco's wartime history. Hear stories from both World Wars and learn about some of the important memorials and honour boards dedicated to these individuals across the City. We will have a collection of the soldiers' oral histories and a display of military memorabilia. This talk will conclude with a special look inside the Subiaco Fallen Soldiers War Memorial.



## Wandaraguttagurru – A look at the Noongar history of the area

Thursday 1 May

---

Ahead of Reconciliation Week, explore the deep history of Noongar people in the area. Learn about the movements of Whadjuk people, following well-established bidis that linked the waterways and swamps with the *Derbarl Yerrigan*. We will discuss some of the Noongar camps in the area that remained in use until the 1950s. Wadjuk community artist Dana Gartlett will be at the museum after the talk to discuss her artworks on display in the community gallery.



## Trams and Trade

Thursday 5 June

---

Learn about the beginnings of the tramway system, its role in the metropolitan community and the reasons for its removal. Come for a journey onboard the No 6 tram in 1900 and stay seated through six decades of growth and change that transformed Subiaco. Covering from January 1900 to April 1958, we will discuss the role the tram and Rokeby Road played in the ever-changing community.



## Researching Your Property and its History

Thursday 3 July

---

Historic buildings are often categorised by a general period of construction or a broad architectural style, but what about the human stories that played out within the walls? Come and learn how to find information about your property, including previous owners, old photographs and original plans.
